## **INSURANCE NEWS**

Due to increases in the cost of the public liability insurance CFMS provides for its member societies/clubs, we found it necessary to increase the per member cost to \$7. This amounts to a \$1 increase (less than the cost of a cup of coffee or bottle of drinking water). The total amount due is \$9. The cost breakdown is \$2 for the CFMS dues and \$7 for the mandatory insurance.

You may have read this report last month, but it remains pertinent, especially since I've received not a single response. I need everyone's help and attention in two specific ways. Please! Can you help!? Please! Kindly spread the word among your club members. Here goes, once again!

### Seeking Help with the 2023 CFMS Show Kids Booth

For 2023 there will be a no-host CFMS Show & Convention June 23-25 at the Lodi Grape Festival Grounds. As CFMS Junior Activities Chair, I welcome and need help. A no-host show means no individual club stepped up to sponsor and run the annual Show & Convention, so the CFMS Board will serve as Show Committee and we need volunteers from clubs throughout the Federation to help however best they can. I've volunteered to run a Kids Booth, and I myself need help in two specific ways:

- 1) Materials. I'm assembling grab bags, spinning wheel prizes, and tiny specimens for sand sifting from my own overflowing rock pile. But I need help! My rock pile isn't as varied as it could be, and I especially need quality items (fossils, minerals, crystals, jewelry, etc.) for spinning wheel prizes. And I need grab bags filled with 10 to 15 items. Also, do you have any tiny items that can be swirled into the sand-sifting box?
- 2) Volunteers. We'll have several stations in the Kids Booth and need volunteers who can help sell grab bags, run the spinning wheel and a sand-sifting box, and oversee other stations including free activities, such as coloring pages, a rock touch-table, and an Excavate-a-Dino box. # Seeking Nominees for the CFMS Junior Achievement Award

At the Awards Banquet during the Show & Convention, I hope to present our CFMS 2023 Junior Achievement Awards. But to do so, we need applicants! Do you have outstanding Pebble Pups or Junior Members in your club? Encourage them to apply. Our CFMS Junior Achievement Award rewards outstanding kids in two age groups: under 12 (Age Group 1) and 12-to-18 (Age Group 2). Kids submit applications, and winners earn a Certificate-of-Achievement and \$100. The application form was distributed at the Fall Directors Meeting in Visalia and posted the CFMS website to i s (https://cfmsinc.org/juniors-achievement-award/). In order to evaluate entries and announce winners at our CFMS Show & Convention in Lodi, the deadline for receipt of applications is March 1, 2023. Applicants must be enrolled in a CFMS-affiliated society. The child's age as of December 31, 2022 determines the age group s/he will be in. If a child won last year, that child will need to wait out a full year to enter again UNLESS s/he has moved up from Age Group 1 to Age Group 2. #### THERE WILL BE A 2023 SHOW!!

After speaking with several societies in their area and finding no takers, the Executive Committee reluctantly decided that CFMS needed to hold a no-host show for 2023. As all are aware we were unable to have our traditional show in 3 of the previous 5 years–in 2018 although a club in northern California graciously invited us to hold a Directors Meeting at their show, as a Federation we were not part of their show except for the Endowment Fund table. COVID prevented us from having a show hosted or otherwise in 2020 or 2021.

The show forms are now posted on the CFMS website. A form for the non-competitive displays will be available as soon as a volunteer to receive the entries is confirmed.

As pointed out in Kimberly's message, we need volunteers to handle all the tasks involved. We are asking those in the nearby area to let Bob or Jim know how you can help. Volunteers will be needed to help with set up, security, admissions, demonstrations, etc. Most importantly all the clubs will have the opportunity to meet members of the public who could possibly become your future members. Bob plans to put the tables promoting membership at the front of the dealers building so these are the first thing visitors see when they enter the building.

We still need a volunteer to coordinate the demo area. That person would help get volunteers willing to spend time demonstrating some of the skills we perform as members of our societies/clubs. Examples would include cabbing, silversmithing, beading, wire wrap. Many a show visitor has decided to join a local club to learn more as a result of the interest generated by watching a demonstration.

We also need someone willing to step forward to help organize the banquet. The event itself will be catered but we need someone to head the committee responsible for decorations and getting the room ready for the event. Will also need a person to coordinate the ticket sales at the gate. Lots of volunteers will be needed—an ideal opportunity for a local club to help.

We should have a Facebook page for the show launched soon. Diane Cook who has experience working with social media took on this project and we thank her.

## PROVIDING PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE By Fred Ott

From time-to-time, we may be asked to provide someone with a 'proof of liability insurance' for such activities as rockhounding on private property/claim or using a facility (such as a fairgrounds or school for a show).

One of the benefits of the Federation's insurance policy is that the \$1 Million of liability insurance coverage applies to any sanctioned society event at which fewer than 500 people will be in attendance at no additional premium. For events (such as rock-and-gem shows) where 500-or-more people will be in attendance, there is an additional premium (which is determined by providing McDaniel Insurance Services a completed form called a Special Event Ouestionnaire which is found on the Federation's website, www.cfmsinc.org). For the owners of property who require a 'written document' to confirm the existence of the \$1 Million of coverage, the 'proof' of liability insurance is a document called a 'certificate of insurance' which is issued by the insurance company through its agent/broker (in our situation, by McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc.). The form can be found on the Federation's website, www.cfmsinc.org and, when completed, can be emailed or faxed to McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc.

On occasion, the owner of the property may insist upon being named an "Additional Insured" together with the Certificate of Insurance. In such circumstances, there must be a 'written agreement' between the owner and your society requiring such Additional Insured endorsement and such document needs to be provided to McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc. when requesting a certificate of insurance.

## **COMMUNICATE FOLKS!**

One of the most important aspects of an organization is how its officers and members communicate with each other.

Most people develop a certain style of communicating. The many become their trademark (unbeknown to them), and can be very important to the success of the group.

Beware of the individual who has charge of some important aspect of the Show or Club who, for weeks and months on end, utters not a word about progress on the task at hand. Of course, everyone is absolutely certain that all is well, sure that he/she is taking care of all the details in his/her usual efficient manner.

Surprise! Three weeks before the show, up pops our member who announces he/she hasn't been able to do the job becausee personal and family problems had to take precedence.

Then take a look at another member over there (sometimes considered the club loudmouth, who just can't stop talking about the things that have been done to accomplish his/her assignment. It might een sound like bragging but gee, learn to put up with it. At least you know what he/she has been up to!

The difference in the two individuals is what is called communication. One is probably frustrated beyond words, not knowing how to take care of his/her end of the bargain, and too scared to admit the truth to anyone. Intimidated, no doubt, by the other person's constant commentary on his/her progress.

One hasn't yet learned to communicate his/frustration, and the other just likes to talk about it because of the good feelings that his/her efforts are paying off.

Perhaps we could help both of these persons to communicate in a more positive fashion if, during the club or show meeting the President or Show Chairman had a checklist of the various tasks that are pending.

If each of the responsible parties was called upon to give a short progress report, he or she would have an opportunity to air any difficulties or roadblocks that stand in the way of accomplishing the task, or ask for assistance–in a timely manner. Conversely, it would be an opportunity to report on some of the glowing successes and accomplishments to date, in an appropriate forum.

If you want your club to run efficiently, don't be afraid to ask for intermittent progress reports. It may give the responsible individuals just the chance they're looking for to let off some steam (or prevent a disaster). And as a bonus, communication just may promote peace of mind.

# SAFETY MATTERS: SAFETY IN THE NEW YEAR

Dedicated readers of this column, it has been an honor to bring these messages of safety to you. Thank you for reproducing some of them in your own newsletters. It has been a pleasure presenting safety messages so we might help one another keep your club members safe. Thank you for sending your safety ideas to me these past few years - by doing so you too have had a hand in keeping others safe...what a team! Thank you, kind readers, for your thoughtful words of encouragement. They have been appreciated. Please be safe. Your safety matters.

Safety guidelines, rules, parameters, restrictions, advisories and more--Oh My. What a lot of safety. What are all these safety documents? They are documents, the following of which are meant to keep people safe from harm. That is straight-forward, but how, where, and when do rules apply and how does one make those judgements? In a word (or three) - practice, judgement, and understanding.

A medical kit is an extremely helpful thing to have in an emergency. But a better use of the kit will be made when the user is familiar with the contents, how to use the items, notes expiration dates before needing the supplies in the kit, and has it available when needed. There are rules and guidelines for almost everything; however, the wise use of those rules often makes the difference of being safe or having problems.

Here are a few ideas worth considering:

- Have multiple people read and understand the guidelines.
- Know where the guidelines apply and where they might not.
- Safely practice the guidelines.
- Get help or research areas where rules are unclear.
- Become knowledgeable where judgements apply, know the risks, and err on the side of safety.
- Make sure everyone knows the rules applicable to the task.
- Common sense goes a long way in being safe.
- Here are a few good starting places for safety guides:
- Medical emergency kit safety booklets
- Equipment guides
- Personal protective gear instructions
- Hand / power tool maintenance recommendations
- Meeting place / show facility rules

• Mine, quarry, pit procedures and restrictions

Your safety matters. That is not a judgement. It is a rule. From *AFMS Newsletter* 3/2021
