Building a Successful Kids Program, Part 3: Plan the Full Year

Plus: Still Seeking Help in our 2023 CFMS Show Kids' Booth!

To Build a Successful Kids Program, Plan a Full Year in Advance...

If you've been reading this column, you know that last year I conducted a survey to gauge the state of kids' programs within CFMS clubs. I promised I'd share "best practices" garnered as a result. In the last two months, I noted the top two ingredients for success involve having a "Kids' Champion" within your club, then having all club members support that Champion with volunteers to provide expertise and resources in leading activities.

The next step? Sometime between October and December, gather folks within your club most invested in encouraging kids and plan out a full year's schedule. Then solicit volunteers who can help with each month's program and publicize that program via your club newsletter and email blasts at the very beginning of the New Year. The worst thing is moving in chaotic fits-and-starts and sending out last-minute announcements on an ad-hoc basis and scrambling to get resources and experts to help.

Clearly specifying each month's activity with the New Year allows everyone to plan. For instance...

- Parents and their kids are always overbooked between work and school activities, sports, band, and other organizations they may belong to (4H, Scouts, etc.). By laying out your full year in advance, they can best identify which topics/activities they would most like to attend and thus carve out the requisite time within already busy schedules.
- Planning a full year allows your volunteer presenters and helpers to plan out their activities and to gather any resources they may need well in advance. A good presentation is a wellplanned presentation.

When planning for each month, make sure everyone is aware of the need to fill that schedule not just with dry, boring talks ("the Mohs scale is composed of 10 minerals, blah, blah"), but with activities that are hands-on and fun from a kids' perspective ("let's start scratching rocks together and use quartz to pulverize talc into dust!"). Each class should include all children going home with new rocks, minerals, or fossils to add to their collections. I've seen some activities that include making toothpaste from mineral products. I don't know about kids today, but the last thing I was interested in when I was a kid was brushing my teeth. But gold panning? Sign me up! Think from a kid's perspective.

In addition to classroom-type presentations and activities, make sure to include at least two kid-oriented field trips each year. When I was growing up in Illinois, the state geological survey sponsored field trips that included collecting opportunities. That was the "crack" that got me totally hooked on this hobby of ours, and many of the specimens I collected remain in my collection some 60 years later. Choose spots close to home (rather than overnight or multi-day trips) and make sure there's plenty of good stuff that can be readily and easily collected to foster enthusiasm rather than fan frustration.

Finally, with one month left to go before our 2023 CFMS Show & Convention...

In my position overseeing the Kids' Booth for our upcoming CFMS Show, I wish to thank Barbra Meisenheimer and Janelle Thompson (both of the Ventura Gem & Mineral Society, VGMS) for sewing and donating no less than 1,800 empty grab bags. Totally awesome! Also thank you to Nancy Bird (Searchers Gem & Mineral Society) for sending a box of chalcedony for use in filling those grab bags and as Kids' Booth Spinning Wheel prizes, and to David Springer and Diane Cook (both of VGMS) for providing calcite rhombs and tumbled stones, respectively. Thanks, as well, to the many folks who have already volunteered their help in the Kids' Booth during the show. Thus far, this includes Dick and Phyllis White (VGMS & Conejo Gem & Mineral Club), Nancy Bird (Searchers), Karen Oliver (Contra Costa Mineral & Gem Society), and Robert Seaton and Nancy Brace-Thompson (both of VGMS). Everyone is coming through in spades, and each and every one is appreciated!

CAMP PARADISE-Part 2

Just before you get to the barn itself, there is a swimming pool to the right. On the concrete pad outside the barn is the lapidary area. Two rows of tables are set with trim saws (2), a large Titan grinding/polishing machine, numerous Genie grinding/polishing machines, an elk hide polisher, a bigger polisher...well, you get the drift. Tom is in charge of this area. A former CFMS President, he is also the blower of the horn to let you know when classes begin and end and when meals are ready. A very important guy! Let me tell you a little about Tom. He has been a lapidarist for more years than he wants me to tell you. Talk about the Stone Age. Yes, pun intended. No lab fee.

Diamond Pacific has always been generous in lending machines to the students and Tom provides his expertise to teach students how to make a perfect cabochon. Once you have done that, the sky's the limit with what you can do in stone cutting and jewelry making. Also in this area we have hard stone carving taught by Bob Rush, currently the 1sr VP for CFMS. He will show you how to take an ugly stone (heaven forbid you have one) and show you the beauty hidden beneath. You will weep with joy at what he can teach you about carving stones. He also writes a regular column in Rock and Gem magazine. There is a lab fee to cover the extensive, expensive bits and burs he uses. Prerequisite is basic lapidary.

Also in this area is Dolly who teaches intarsia. This is her first year teaching at Paradise but she is very experienced and a delight to be around. This will be a class that requires 24 hours after have assembled your piece. There is also a class fee. Prerequisite is basic lapidary. Before we go into the barn I should point out that next to the mess hall is the soft stone carving area taught by Tammi, who is young at heart and a very sweet carver. Nestled under the shade of the trees, she gently guides your decision making about what you want to create. A little (or maybe not so little) soap stone, some hand tools or maybe electric tools and you are on your way to making your vision a reality. You will want to bring an apron and maybe a mask for this class. There is a fee for some materials. No prerequisite.

Also in this area and situated inside the mess hall is the faceting area. Yes, the fascinating faceting. Gary Gooch teaches this and is a pro. Don't tell him I said so! and don't let his kind demeanor fool you. He is a tiger when it comes to faceting. If you have your own faceting machine you may bring it but he also has machines you can use. Here the students learn how to make stones flat as opposed to lapidary where they teach making stones round. Ahem...I digress. If you have ever seen the difference between a rough stone just from the ground and that same stone faceted then you know that this is magical. The way the light is captured and bounces back to you is a sight to behold. You can do that in this class. No materials fee. No prerequisite.

I started my jewelry career here in Camp Paradise and at the Reno Gem and Mineral Society. I didn't know what an exciting, creative, wonderful time I would have making jewelry. I have bought DVD's, gone to jewelry school classes but can honestly say that I learn more from my weeks at Camp Paradise jewelry camp than by any other mode. I am happy to tell you more about what you too can learn at Camp Paradise. Last month I told you about "the barn". This month I will begin telling you about it because there is a lot to learn.

When you walk in the barn, to your immediate right is the beginning silversmith class. Through the ages silver and gold have always captured peoples imagination. It has intrinsic value but more than that a silversmith can take a flat piece of metal and turn it into a thing of beauty. This class sets you on the road to doing just that. Taught by Steve (husband to Glenda) and one of the nicest guys you will meet, he will guide you from how to hold a saw for cutting metal, working a torch, what solder does, the does and don'ts of pickle (and what pickle is) to cleaning metal and polishing your finished piece. When you are done you have a piece of jewelry of which you can be proud. This is a 2 1/2 day class beginning on Mondays and Wednesday afternoons and there is a \$25.00 materials fee. No prerequisite.



Just beyond the beginning silver fabricating area is the advanced silversmithing taught by Moi, Jill, who will help you achieve your g o a l s i n silversmithing. Just contact me before (weeks before not days

before) and let me know what you want to learn so I bring the correct equipment. There is a \$5.00 per week supply fee. Advanced silversmithing is where you earn your stripes as a silversmith. If you have taken beginning silver classes elsewhere (within 3 years) this is your chance to polish those skills. (Pun intended.) In addition to Jill, your fellow students add to the collective information available...and not only in class. Countless times throughout the week you will find, get, make opportunities to talk with other students about a jewelry problem you have or you may be a solution to someone else's problem. Camp Paradise is the answer place and the sharing place. You could wear a diamond tiara and no one looks askance at you. The first question they ask is, "Did you make that?" And the other question is, "How did you do that?" Prerequisite is basic silversmithing within the last 3 years.

You know what I'm going to say next. Keep saving that moola for a few more months and you will be well on your way to joining in this wonderful educational opportunity.

SAFETY

SNAKE BITE FIRST AID

- 1 Stay calm, get safely away from the snake, and have someone call 9-1-1 (or the emergency number in your area). The less the victim moves the bitten site, the less likely the venom will be spread through the body and cause damage.
- 2 Have the victim lie down with the affected limb lower than the heart. Keep the limb immobilized. If practical, splint the limb.
- 3 Treat for shock and preserve body heat.
- 4 Remove any rings, bracelets, boots, or other restricting items from the bitten extremity. (It WILL swell.)
- 5 Apply a light constricting band about 2" above and below the bite, however never place the bands on either side of a joint (such as above and below the knee or elbow). This band should be made up of wide, soft material, which could be a handkerchief or shredded clothing. The band should only be as tight as the band the nurse applies when taking a blood test.
- 6 NOTE: The purpose of constricting bands is to restrict lymphatic flow, not blood, so they should not be too tight. Check pulses below the bands and readjust the bands as necessary when they tighten due to swelling.
- 7 Wash the bite with soap and water (if available).
- 8 If the victim has to walk out, sit calmly for 20-30 minutes to let the venom localize at the site, then proceed calmly to the nearest source of help and try to avoid unnecessary exertion which will stimulate circulation of the venom.
- 9 Get the victim to definitive medical care for antivenin, which will provide the greatest relief from the toxic effects of the bite.
- 10 Bring in the dead snake only if this can be done without risk of further injury. Do not waste time hunting for the snake, and do not risk another bite if it is not easy to kill the snake. Be careful of the head when transporting it -- a dead snake can bite from reflex for up to an hour.

ACTIONS TO AVOID:

1 DO NOT cut the bite. The additional tissue damage may actually increase the diffusion of the toxins throughout the body.

- 2 DO NOT apply a tourniquet. Such action can result in the loss of the limb.
- 3 NEVER try to suck out the venom by mouth. You can try the suction cup in a snakebite kit if it doesn't delay other needed treatment. Suctioning seldom provides any measurable advantages, however.
- 4 Do not apply cold and/or ice packs. Recent studies indicate that application of cold or ice makes the injury much worse.

The recommended treatments presented are those published in the current edition of *Brady's Emergency Care for the Sick and Injured*, the standard training and procedures manual for Emergency Medical Technicians.

PROVIDING PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE

From time-to-time, we may be asked to provide someone with a 'proof of liability insurance' for such activities as rockhounding on private property/claim or using a facility (such as a fairgrounds or school for a show).

One of the benefits of the Federation's insurance policy is that the \$1 Million of liability insurance coverage applies to any sanctioned society event at which fewer than 500 (now increased to 1000) people will be in attendance at no additional premium. For events (such as rock-and-gem shows) where 500-or-more people will be in attendance, there is an additional premium (which is determined by providing McDaniel Insurance Services a completed form called a **Special Event Questionnaire** which is found on the Federation's website, www.cfmsinc.org).

For the owners of property who require a 'written document' to confirm the existence of the \$1 Million of coverage, the 'proof' of liability insurance is a document called a 'certificate of insurance' which is issued by the insurance company through its agent/broker (in our situation, by McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc.). The form can be found on the Federation's website, www.cfmsinc.org and, when completed, can be emailed or faxed to McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc.

On occasion, the owner of the property may insist upon being named an "Additional Insured" together with the Certificate of Insurance. In such circumstances, there must be a 'written agreement' between the owner and your society requiring such Additional Insured endorsement and such document needs to be provided to McDaniel Insurance Services, Inc. when requesting a certificate of insurance.
