Seeking Participants—and Judges—for 2024 Junior Achievement

Seeking Participants. As I've noted in the past, we hope to present our Fourth Annual CFMS Junior Achievement Awards at the CFMS-AFMS Show & Convention Banquet on May 25. As a recap, Junior Achievement Awards acknowledge and reward outstanding kids under 12 (Age Group 1) and ages 12-18 (Age Group 2). Kids submit applications, and winners earn a Certificate-of-Achievement and \$100. An application form was distributed at the Fall Directors' Meeting and may also be found in the December CFMS Newsletter. It's also posted to the CFMS website (https://cfmsinc.org/juniorsachievement-award/). Please share this info with parents in your club and help encourage their kids to enter. The deadline for receipt of applications is March 1, 2024; send to jbraceth@roadrunner.com. Applicants must be enrolled in a CFMS-affiliated society. The child's age as of December 31, 2023 determines the age group. If a child won last year, he or she will need to wait out a full year to enter again UNLESS s/he has moved up from Age Group 1 to Age Group 2. Kids who submitted applications last year but didn't win can enter again this year.

Seeking Judges. To determine our winners, we need judges! We need at least three volunteers from three different local societies to ensure unbiased results. I wish to thank Yvonne Mack (President of Hi Desert Gold Diggers) for stepping forward already. If you, too, can help, please contact me at jbraceth@roadrunner.com. As a judge, you'll evaluate each child's application with a score sheet that awards points across four areas of accomplishment: hobby-related, educational achievement, community involvement, and work-related. Scores from all judges will be added together and averaged to select winners. Past judges have said it's a fun and fulfilling job, so here's to having fun in the New Year helping deserving kids earn recognition!

Encourage Club Kids to become Cub Reporters

The American Federation's Juniors Program has a new opportunity for the kids in your local society. Lora Hall and her team have crafted a new juniors' newsletter, *Crack the News*, written by kids for kids. CAMP PARADISE REGISTRATION OPENS MARCH 15

Jill Atkins recently received a letter from a student at last year's session and wanted to share.

My Summer Vacation at Camp Paradise

In the spring of 2023, I was a new member of the MGSCV and I saw posted on the board in the Shop an announcement of Camp Paradise, the Rock Camp run by the California Society of Gem and Minerals. (ed note: California Federation of Mineralogical Societies) It was one week of Camp for \$500. Really, \$500 for a week's classes, food and shelter. What a deal! I decided to go, even though I didn't know anyone else who would be going. It turned out that everyone at Camp was friendly, so not knowing anyone on day one wasn't a problem. Although we stayed in a dormitory, we each had our own room. The bathroom/shower area was shared. I brought a mattress topper for the bed, and a small lamp. I was very happy to have those "extras".

There were so many classes to choose between. I took the Beginning Metal Smithing Class, which was an intensive three-day class. It was limited to 6 students, so each of us received plenty of help. The teacher started us with practicing sawing and filing. And then went on to complex things like soldering, and bending the bezel wire smoothly around our cabochon. At the end, we each had a beautiful silver pendant. For this class the teacher supplied all tools which would be used.

For the last 2 ½ days of camp, I chose to work with one of the two old timer lapidary teachers. My teacher had expert knowledge of scribing lines and/or making bubbles on the backs of stones, so that light shown through. Part of the class involved making "tools". It turns out that you can polish stone using wooden dowels, after you have properly shaped them. We also had instruction in drilling a hole through glass or stone. Rather than using a solid drill bit, your bit is an "O" shape. The process is drill, dip in water, drill, more water. Using a caliper, you can figure out when you are close to going through. When you only have another few millimeters to drill, you start on the other side. That provides you a clean edge to both ends of the hole.

There were other classes that would have been great if I had more time: lost wax casting, intarsia, faceting, soft stone carving, advanced silversmithing, to name just a few.

It is my intention to return this upcoming summer. I hope some of you will join me at camp so that I'm not the lone MGSCV (ed. note: Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley) member there. If you have questions, I would be happy to tell you more about my experiences.

SO YOU WANT TO EXHIBIT HOW DO I START

You can approach the prospect of exhibiting something by simply deciding what type of display you wish to create. Most of us are primarily interested in one or two areas of the gem and mineral realm. Some areas are highly specialized, others are more general.

My primary area of interest is minerals, specifically thumbnail (1" x 1") specimens. Someone else may specialize in some type of lapidary or jewelry arts. Maybe you prefer to develop a display which will help teach someone a concept or a skill. Whatever you decide to do is your biggest hurdle.

Once you decide what you want to do, it is important to look at the requirements for your display. If you are entering a display in competition, the guidelines are spelled out in a manual. If you are entering a non-competitive exhibit, I still recommend you consult the AFMS Rules book since the guidelines provided will help you create a display that will appeal to the viewing public.

Where is this manual, you may ask. The AFMS Rules Book is available on the AFMS website; a link is on the CFMS website as well. Don't be put off by the volume of sections and pages. All you have to do is go to the section which covers the type of exhibit you want to develop. There is some general information that applies to everyone who decides to enter competition, but for now just concentrate on the guidelines covering your proposed exhibit. This past year it was decided to break down the manual into separate sections to make it easier to find the section which applies to you.

Now that you know what you want to display, it's time to gather up everything that you will need. Does your club have a case you can borrow or will you be able to rent one from the club hosting the show. Measure the inside dimensions of the case so you will know what size to cut the forms you will use to create your liners. The easiest forms to make are cardboard. If you or a friend have access to a table saw you can use thin particle board or masonite. I personally like cardboard because all you need to cut it is a box cutter or exacto knife. Once the forms are ready, it's time to cover them with some type of material. As mentioned in a previous article, smooth textured materials in neutral colors are recommended. Do avoid bright colors or shiny materials. Spray on adhesives are generally okay to use but be sure it doesn't bleed thru. Packaging tape is okay but it sometimes pulls loose.

Now that you have your liners done, it's time to decide what is needed to display the items going into the display. I sometimes refer to these accessories as "furniture". These can range from risers made from fabric covered styrofoam to a dais on which to display the items. I will be the first person to admit that covering risers, especially those which have squared off corners is not easy. It helps if you use fabric which has an amount of stretch. As a person who displays minerals, I use a fabric covered wooden dais which a neighbor made for me many years ago.

When you decide what items are going in the display, it's time to make your labels. It really isn't necessary to go to the expense of having engraved plastic name plates made although I have seen these. There are less expensive alternatives. White cardstock or transparency material is what I recommend. Once the labels are created and printed, you can use a paper cutter to cut them to a uniform size. Scissors are okay in a pinch but a paper cutter makes the job easier and your labels will be more even. Hint: before you hit print, be sure to proofread everything to make sure all spelling is correct and needed information is there. There is nothing more annoying than realizing you have a typo after you've printed everything and have to redo one or more of the labels.

Why labels? You might know what everything is but remember you are putting in this display to help inform the viewers. People want to know what they are looking at. The whole idea behind this whole exhibiting thing is to get people interested in what we do and hopefully learn something new.

How much should I put in my display? Is there a preferred way to arrange everything? The quantity of stuff you put in is dictated by what it is you are displaying. If a case is too busy, the eye is confused and people will tend to walk on by because they are unable to focus on anything. Aim to set up a display which is pleasing to the eye; you might consider placing your showiest or most unusual piece toward the center where it is easily seen. Most people tend to view things from one side of the case to the center and on around to the other side.

Now that you have your case done and all set up, it's time to get a second opinion. Have someone else take a look at the display to see what they think. Last but not least, take a moment and make a diagram of the display so when you get to the exhibit hall, you know exactly where everything is supposed to go. There will be plenty of cases available to borrow. See you at the show.
