
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES

THE ALL AMERICAN CLUB YEARBOOK

2025 - What you need to know about the All American Club Yearbook

IMPORTANT! – A very early deadline for entry into the AFMS contest due to the show being early in 2025. Please send your entry to Diane Cook @ DianeCook.cfms@gmail.com by January 13, 2025. Your book will be judged at CFMS and then automatically be passed up to the AFMS for judging. This is for your club's activity in 2024.

The All American Club Award is given to the individual club Yearbook, highlighting a club's activities for the past year, including group activities, individual member participation, workshops and shows. Credit is given for attendance at regional and national shows, participation at meetings, holding officer positions on various committees, writing to state representatives, and involvement in ALAA - all these activities reflect an active club that makes membership worthwhile for everyone. The AACA awards are recognition of these activities, with bronze, silver and gold levels and an overall 1st place gold award.

Take a look at what your club has accomplished this past year, and give credit where credit is due!. The more members contribute to the yearbook, the more completely it can serve as an historical document for the club, as well as an excellent tool to encourage prospective members. Canvassing members for any missing documentation, letters, flyers or other materials to fill in some gaps just might make the difference between a good club and a great Club Yearbook entry.

Take advantage of the guide that is on the AFMS site written by John Washburn. "An All American Club Yearbook: A Guide for Preparation." This gives an explanation of each section, and what judges look for in rating the entries. It also highlights areas that are usually the weakest for many clubs and offers suggestions to improve those areas, as well as hints and tips for organizing the book.

Remember – you can get credit for activities such as participation in Competitive Displays, Junior activities, and for club members volunteering as Judges for AFMS contests.

PDF entries are welcome as it saves a lot in postage. Page limit is 150 single pages for the pdf, and 100 double sided pages if printed.

As I write these words, no local society has stepped up to the plate to host a 2025 CFMS Show and Convention. Until one does, I'm pretty much stuck. With no show date or venue, I can't issue calls for exhibitors, much less post pertinent paperwork like Exhibitor Application forms with due dates and other show info.

Over the course of my long, happy career within CFMS, I've enjoyed serving on no fewer than seven federation show committees, both as part of a hosting club and as part of a rag-tag crew pulling together nohost shows. It's not that hard to do! Will 2025 go down in history as the only year CFMS has not held a show and convention aside from the World War II and COVID years? I sure hope not. As the head of the 2025 Rules Committee charged with assembling and evaluating competitive exhibits, give me a job—please!

Editors note: Thank you for the compliments. Despite the challenges presented, the job got done with a minimum of confusion and the help of my fellow committee members.

Like Jim, I've done my share of federation shows, as a co-chair of two hosted shows and a committee member of three no-host shows. The shows are not that difficult to put on and you have the assistance of a CFMS show coordinator who will offer guidance as needed. By the way the two shows for which I served as co-chair were hosted by a gold prospecting club which had no show experience. If a prospecting club could do it, surely a traditional gem & mineral club can.



Appreciating a Blast-from-the-Past: Practicing Public Relations All Year Long

In future articles, I'll turn to our current media age and the need to fully embrace social media in pursuing effective public relations campaigns. But this month, I'll again return to a "blast-from-the-past" and embrace Francis Sick's advice from the "old school" days. Fran was our AFMS Public Relations Chair from 2007 to 2011, and she was our last PR Chair to religiously provide advice month after month within these pages. I encourage you to read her super-helpful columns in our AFMS Newsletter archives at https://www.amfed.org/news/default.htm. Fran suggested more than a decade ago that we need to practice public relations all year long: As she said, "One weekend a year doesn't do it."

All too often, clubs do a one-time, one-year blitz focused on publicizing an annual show for something like a one- to three-month period and then go dormant for the next nine to eleven months. But public relations needs to be an ongoing all-year process, not a one-time event focused on a one-time activity. As Fran wrote back in 2008, "successful clubs are doing everything they can to make themselves known and appreciated in their communities. They make use of any public forum available to them."

In my own local community, we have a free biweekly newspaper and a free monthly publication that both whole-heartedly publicize events sponsored by clubs, societies, and other groups that merely need contacting to be included. The "merely" is the important part of that last sentence.

Do you have someone in your club enlisted to "merely" provide such info? It's not that hard. You just find out the required deadline and where to send info about an upcoming club meeting, tailgate, field trip, show, or other event, and you send a simple announcement that often involves no more than a sentence or two. For instance, "The Ventura Gem & Mineral Society holds its monthly meeting on March 22, when we will host an exciting speaker telling us about dinosaur digs in Wyoming and an exciting field trip opportunity for this coming summer. Join us at 7:30 PM at Poinsettia Pavilion!" This is easy "old school" stuff that all too many clubs neglect, including my own. Just like many rock clubs, local newspapers are a dying breed. Let's interact, support, and help one another live long and prosper!

As Fran wrote back in 2009, "Give more detailed information about what we offer. Don't just advertise the club show. Make all your club events sound so exciting that people can't wait to come. Don't just mention the club has a workshop. Whatever your club is doing that you love, others will love as well if only they know enough about it to encourage them to come in the first place."

THE ART OF BEING THE MEANINGFUL HISTORIAN

As Historians, you have a meaningful job and are a great value to your organization. You are the keepers of all things memorable and significant. You are the storytellers of the past, for today, and the storytellers for the future generations of historians who will be thumbing through your files to celebrate the joys of the earth sciences, and the practice of lapidary arts and crafts. Think of your file boxes as gift boxes given to you, and the gift boxes you are creating to give to the future of our hobby someday.

I thought this might be a good time to begin talking to you about the many ways you can take care of your society and federation historian files. Over the many years there have been society, federation and AFMS historians. Lots of boxes and even metal cabinets have been passed from one historian to another over generations of time.

This accumulation of so much history can produce a sense of anxiety and a quandary of wondering how to manage not only the space to hold the material, but how to protect it and how to find what you are looking for. Some have asked if it's even valuable enough to hold onto so much accumulated material. Especially for federations and the AFMS, transporting all the files from a retiring historian to someone new can pose a problem due to the vast traveling distances within their territory. There aren't any hard-set rules of how to go about this, unless your society or federation states them. You or your society may have piles of file boxes that haven't been looked at in ages. You might be wondering what condition they are in at this point and thinking, what on earth should be done with them. I am here to offer some good pointers and some creative ideas to help you out.

There are so many treasures in those boxes when you are able to find them. Maybe not 100% that you might find personally interesting, but gems in the figurative sense and literally to inspire your members today. As historians, you are usually the backup for storing copies of your organization's business meeting minutes and reports. You also have the special job of keeping copies of your organization's newsletters, photos and news clippings of the year's events and sometimes storing mementos. You are the person members will say at some time or another, "thank you so much for keeping the good memories and for remembering us."

There are different aspects of being a historian. There are various choices available to you about how you can take care of your files, along with ideas to make finding things in the future easier for you. Some organizations are digitizing their files, butif that's not your cup of tea right now, that's alright too. Stick with me over the

next few months, and in between other historian articles for the AFMS, we'll go through those boxes together.
